Talk for Maths

This practical, hands-on workshop will look at:

- What should exploratory talk look like in maths and how can it deepen understanding?
- How can manipulatives be used as a tool for talk?

- How can oracy help combat maths anxiety and help student's confidence grow?

Educators will gain insights into how to create an affirming space for all voices, recognising the cultural wealth students bring with them and using it to enhance their oracy skills.

By the end of the workshop, participants will be equipped with practical tools to promote effective communication for BBE speakers, ensuring every child's voice is heard and valued in the school community.

From vision to implementation: oracy at a whole trust level

In this session, school and trust leaders from the Leigh Trust, a group of five primary schools in Birmingham, will share their journey towards oracy excellence and the impact they have already seen on children's oracy within 18 months of becoming a Voice 21 Oracy School. You'll gain an insight into how to set a strategic vision for oracy at a trust level, while reflecting each schools' context, motivations and individual priorities, as well as some practical approaches to oracy. Don't miss this if you're interested in learning about the strategic implementation of a high quality oracy education.

Anchoring Curriculum in Community: Personalising your oracy provision to your school context

Join Chaitan Rajania from Madani Schools to explore how Oracy and Cultural Literacy can address your student community's needs. Listening beyond the physical

Hear from Castle Phoenix Trust on how, in just 20 minutes a week, they have transformed their approach to staff CPD in oracy through seamlessly weaving staff development into the fabric of weekly assemblies. This session will explore how schools facing time constraints can strategically utilise assembly time to foster staff development, enhance oracy teaching consistency, and elevate students' oracy skills, hearing about their impact from the perspectives of pupils, staff, and parents. You'll leave with practical steps and actionable strategies to plan and execute effective oracy assemblies.

Oracy and cultural capital: transformation through talk?

Oracy is sometimes associated with developing students' cultural capital. However, there is a danger that this is construed only narrowly as accumulating and adopting the knowledge, skills and behaviours of the powerful. This session invites attendees to consider how oracy might lead to more fundamental personal and societal transformation through developing authentic voice in meaningful contexts. This potential will be illustrated through classroom examples intended to provoke reflection and discussion on attendees' own settings.

Turn up the volume: how to deliver whole school oracy events

It is no secret that talking about sexual violence is a crucial first step to tackling it - but is it easier said than done? What happens when the harmful gender stereotypes we are trying to address are playing out in front of us in the very way young people are talking. What happens when we can't separate the culture from the conversation?

This session, led by sector experts Bold Voices, will explore and highlight:

- Some of the unique gendered barriers young people face in navigating critical conversations about gender inequality and sexual violence
- reframing 'debates' to 'conversations'
- Essential facilitation-based tools that can be used to better curate spaces for critical and transformative conversations amongst young people

Alternative Voices: how oracy can support literacy learning

Hear Sharon Gray and Danielle Egan from Coventry Extended Learning Centre, an Alternative Provision, talk about their approach to implementation with Voice 21 in their first year and their innovative take on using oracy to develop literacy. Sharon, along with Joe Cook, their music teacher, will talk about their 'Lyricature' programme in particular, where writing and performing rap has been feeding into literacy learning - earning students a chance to perform at the Godiva festival and collaborate with a local theatre on a spoken word production of Romeo and Juliet. Danielle will illustrate how oracy has elevated our students' creative writing to an unprecedented abstract level in their setting.

Join Emily Thomas and Hannah Munroe as they share how Pinner Wood School have successfully integrated speech-making into their curriculum, ensuring that all students are supported to participate in progressively challenging talk. In this session, you will hear how they have prioritised speech-making through adapting their curriculum. You will find out how to apply a range of practical strategies to support implementation across a unit of work or whole school initiative. You will also explore the role the wider school community plays in championing oracy education.

Help Me Find My Voice

Some children are playground confident, classroom shy. Outside they'll talk confidently with their peers. Inside, they shut down and their voices are rarely heard. This session, hosted by The Philosophy Man, explores how to bring some of that playground confidence inside and other strategies to overcome "oracy blockers" and help more children find their voices.

Lessons in linguistic diversity

In this session, we will share the lessons learned and insights gained from Voice 21's recent learning community focusing on linguistic diversity. We'll explore: what it is; the connection between language and identity and will share our top five tips for ensuring classrooms are spaces in which every voice is valued.

Speaking Through Art

In a world increasingly saturated with images, it is crucial that we teach our young people how to think and speak critically about the visual world. This session explores the relationship between art and oracy, digging into how art and cultural artefacts can be used as stimuli for exploratory talk to support the teaching of critical thinking. The session will touch on insights from our collaborative pilot project and current research with The National Gallery.

English as an Additional Language: using oracy to create an inclusive classroom

This workshop will explore simple and practical strategies to further develop social, linguistic and academic inclusion in your classroom so that EAL learners can be fully engaged in curriculum learning and can thrive and achieve their potential. Karen Warwick from The Bell Foundation will explore how an oracy-rich culture will support EAL learners regardless of their proficiency in English, and that this doesn't need to be time consuming for the teachers!
